ADDISON FAMILY HISTORY

CELEBRATING OVER 200 YEARS IN WASHINGTON, DC (1804-2015)



HOWARD REUBEN ADDISON

U.S. Chaplain Rev. Walter Addison was an abolitionist who freed his inherited slaves in the year 1800. He set them free just before Congress held their first legislative session in Washington, DC. The Black Addison family has continuously resided in the Nation's Capital for its entire existence. They also inherited land on the Eastern Branch. Born in 1804, Robert Addison was an African American who helped establish the town

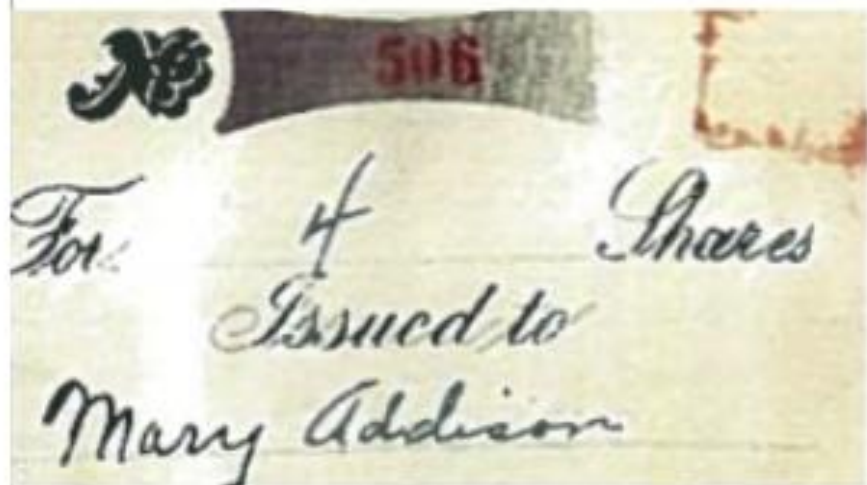
of Tuoluma, CA during the gold rush. They owned land in Hillsdale, Good Hope Hill and Stantontown, DC. Robert's son Rev. Thomas Henry Addison was a civil war soldier who enlisted in the 23 Regiment, U.S. Col. Infantry and fought battles as far as Ft. Myers, TX. He returned to Annapolis, MD and receive an honorable discharge. He also helped to build the oldest church East of the Anacostia River, Allen Chapel A.M.E. on Good Hope Hill, DC. He also pastored Metropolitan Bethal A.M.E.'s MD branch. Robert's grandson Lemuel Robert Addison was a 32 degree mason and leader in the Strivers District Movement of U street in the early 1900's. Lemuel and his wife Mary were original investors of the Industrial Bank of Washington for

over 75 years. The Addison family is one of the oldest families of record in Washington, DC. They originally descended from

Detective Thurman Stallings

Detective Thurman Stallings was born in Washington DC. He also attended and graduated from McKinley High School. Joined the ranks of the Metropolitan Police Department (MPDC), and worked his way to the position of Detective. Detective Stallings has been with the Metropolitan Police Department for 25 years. We salute his courageous and dedicated public service.

He also is the President of the East Coast Rough Riders (ECRR) horsemen. Detective Thurman Stallings and his organization are active in supporting the United Cancer Society, Domestic Violence and homeless people with the proper needed personal essentials. Therefore we acknowledge him as one of our Black History Makers.



Pastor Robert E. Slade

Born in Potecasi, North Carolina, number 4 out of 9 siblings. In 1970 he earned a BS degree from Elizabeth City State University of North Carolina and his Masters from Bowie State University, Maryland in 1974. Also received his Master of Divinity from Howard University in 1994. As a selfless teacher and devoted pastor and a great reformer. Pastor Robert Slade began his career at High Park Elementary School in Seat Pleasant Maryland to include John Carroll Elementary School and Oak Crest Elementary School. He retired from the school system with 30 years of service.

Pastor Robert Slade began his ministry in 2000. He is currently the minister of Grace United Methodist AME Zion Church in Fort Washington MD. Pastor Slade is a cowboy at heart. Every year in February a western day service is held at his church to bless and pray for the cowboys and cowgirls to have a safe year. He also founded an Equestrian summer camp for underprivileged children, attended by children from the metropolitan area, NC, VA, PA and OH. It is a time when children can learn about the cowboy way of life, themselves, group work, respect for each other and the animals that they are riding. Not to mention that there are instructors for each age group and also medical personal on site. This program is in its 9th year. And this is why we consider Pastor Robert E. Slade a Black history maker





Mrs. Rhoda Ray Slade

Born in Calvert County Maryland to Helen and Wilson Ray. She is the fourth of seven siblings. She received her Bachelor of Science Degree from Bowie State University in 1970 and her Masters in Administration and Supervision in 1974. For 33 years she has impacted the lives of thousands of children in Prince George's County in the classroom and in administrative positions. Because of her love and compassion for

children and her willingness to potentially inspire change through education, she is referred to many as a powerhouse. She started her career in the classroom at Highland Park Elementary School in Prince George's County, Maryland. In 1986 she was appointed to the position of Science, Technology, Mathematics Program Coordinator (STEM). Later she became Program Specialist for the Challenge Program and Vice Principal of Mattaponi Elementary School. She had such an impact on the young lives at Mattaponi that she was appointed principal for the duration of her career. Mrs. Slade's stellar career impacted over 86,000 lives of our youth. To sum it all up, she worked 66 hours a week, 264 hours a month, 3,168 hours a year, 104,544 hours totaling 33 years.

She currently enjoys her retirement, but appreciates the privilege of serving her community and church. She truly enjoys teaching adult Sunday School, singing in church choirs, serving as lay servant and supporting all the other ministries where needed. Her commitment to the Annual Equestrian Summer Camp that serves so many of our underprivileged children from the Washington Metropolitan Area and some youth even from other states. Her stellar career and years of

dedication, faithfulness, tireless devotion to our children is commendable and worthy of recognition. Therefore we acknowledge her as one of our Black History Makers.
